Julie Long, League of Women Voters. One of the challenges ahead is mobilizing the communities. I want to thank Todd Storty for carrying the message to the community, especially the Broward School District. He spoke at the Broward county association of Student Councils last month. He also spoke at the district Green School Advisory Board this month. Members of the administrative staff in the district have toured the coastal recycling plant as well as a local community composting company because they understand the enormity of the waste problem. The district is working on making recycling a reality. The school district, as community leaders, the members of the executive committee and the governing board have unique abilities to encourage the schools.

I'm asking that all the elected officials contact the principals of the elementary, middle and high schools in their communities and ask them to ask the schools to get on board for this project. If each of the leaders would do this would increase the chance of an effective recycling program in our schools and it would decrease waste going to landfills as well as educating the next generation of members of this community. Hi. First, I want to express my sincere appreciation for all the hard work, time, dedication that has gone into and continues to go into developing master plan. I look ahead to supporting this process moves forward and helping to move it across the finish line. I also want to acknowledge the Education Outreach subcommittee for producing such engaging videos and public service announcements. The emphasis on public health and cost stabilization is essential and I appreciate how thoughtfully that message has been relevant throughout your work. That said, I do have a few suggestions I hope you'll consider as you refine these materials. First, the flow control video refers to our waste energy plant as being at capacity.

I'm not sure the public is familiar with the term waste to energy, and even if they are, it may unintentionally suggest that expanding that capacity would allow us simply to make garbage disappear while generating more energy. Since the video later uses the plain language phrase burning garbage, I believe that terminology should be used consistently throughout. It's more accessible and it aligns better, most importantly, with the public health message we're trying to convey. 2 the children's video is charming, powerful and memorable. However, a very young child using the phrase waste energy plant feels out of place. Children simply wouldn't use that terminology. Burning garbage is something a child could realistically say, and it keeps them message authentic and clear. 3. The same terminology concern applies to the PSA and the Solving the Waste Crisis videos.

Consistency in plain language would help the public understand the issue more easily. Finally, I want to highlight a great suggestion that came up from a subcommittee member, I think, Commissioner Mattea Brown, the importance of a clear, memorable slogan, something equivalent to the Buckle up campaign. I strongly agree a unifying slogan would strengthen the entire outreach effort. Looking ahead, I'd love to see all future videos incorporate that idea. For example, think before you throw our future depends on it. Or for teens, talk trash. Be the gem that saves the planet. Thank you again for your incredible work and for taking these suggestions into consideration. I'm excited to continue collaborating as we move forward.

Tammy Lethierry Coconut Creek, Florida after conducting a study involving dementia and particulate matter 2.5, aka PM2.5, Dr. Edward Lee, a neuropathologist at the University of Pennsylvania, concluded, the quality of the air you live in affects your cognition. PM2.5 is a byproduct of incineration. It's extremely small and is more commonly associated with cardiopulmonary diseases and cancer due to exposure from dioxins, furans, and heavy metals. But it's also a neurotoxin, and it's quite damaging to the central nervous system because of its minute size and the direct pathway it takes from the nose to the brain, which is once inhaled. The bottom line is there is increasing evidence that links PM2.5 with dementia of the Lewy body type. Have you had the misfortune of caring for or living with people who suffer from dementia? I Have. It's a life altering experience.



Speaker 2 - 06:46

Lewy Body Dementia is particularly tragic because they suffer from hallucinations. So when a cluster of dementia patients develops in and around the proposed refurbished South Broward incinerator, I propose we name it SWA Induced Dementia, with classifications for symptomatology named after each governing board member who voted in favor of incineration expansion. One takeaway while suffering the misinformation touted here in these meetings is that incineration with new technology is not only safe, but equates to renewable energy. Neither are true.

Incineration is a major CO2 emitter. According to Zero Waste Europe, when we burn plastics, we burn fossil carbons which have a higher CO2 emission rate. Burning plastics derived from crude oil poses major threats to our health and the climate. In response to members lauding incineration at Copenhill Denmark, know that Denmark is reducing incinerated capacity by 30% and closing seven of them.

Zero Waste Scotland found that 52% of incinerator waste could have been recycled to pretend that newer incinerates.



Speaker 1 - 08:10

Speaker 2 - 08:19

To pretend that newer incinerators are the solution to mismanaging waste disposal for the last 10 years and minimizing methane emissions from landfill is unsupported by the facts. You're trading one environmental tragedy for another.

Thank you. Anyone else who didn't sign up, who wishes to speak? All right, we'll close public comment meeting minutes. We have a motion on November 10, 2025. Executive committee meetings, minutes. We have a motion by member material Brown. Do we have a second? Second by member Newton. All in favor? Any edits, comments or suggestions? All in favor, say aye. Any opposed? All right. Executive director's report. Alex. Good morning, everybody. Thank you for coming to executive committee meeting. We'll have financial update. We'll have Alex from Cone Resnick provide an update. We're having some technical difficulty with the video monitors right now. They're working through that, but Alex will be able to go through our financial position. Alex Floors? Yes. Alex Petrone, partner with Cone Wrestling, CPA firm. I'm here to give the Broward SWA month, end of October 2025. This is the third fiscal year.



Speaker 1 - 09:37

The beginning of the third fiscal year, which spans from October 1st of 2025 through September 30th of 2026 for the end of October, cash and cash equivalents totaled \$2,175,891. The accounts receivable balance is up to \$2,007,380. That represents the fact that we have invoice for the third fiscal year. The \$2 million worth of assessments. We'll discuss that on the statement of profit and Loss in the next page. The assessments were or the invoices were generated at the end of October, which is why they're represented on the balance sheet. The cities should have received invoices. They'll certainly receive them if not by next week, certainly by the end of this

month. They were mailed out early last week for liabilities. Total liabilities as of October 31st of 262,311. The net position or net equity of the authority at the end of October is \$3,920,960.

For the current month profit and loss, Obviously we're representing \$2 million of accrued revenue hasn't been received yet. Total expenses for the month were 150,551, primarily professional services, legal expenses and salary. That leaves a current profit for the first month of 1,851,237. Obviously that'll be worked down month after month as expenses come through. Any questions? I'll check them out. Any questions on the financial statements? Yes, Member Horliff?

Yes, thank you, Alex. I'm sorry, I can't get a connection so I can't pull up the report. But I did make a couple of notes. It's very, you know, in my estimation, very vanilla financial report. Is it possible that we can get a statement of revenue expenditures, changes in the fund balance as it relates to the adopted budget as well as year to date, actual monthly actual. And I also wanted to know what that interest rate on these CD repeating.

So the interest rate is, I believe 3.57 short term CD generally roll them every three months. Okay, and is that the highest rate possible at that time? Yes, it is. Okay, go ahead.

Yeah, I'm sure it was. City rates have not been that great, but is it possible that we can get a little more information in this report and in the spirit of transparency?



Speaker 1 - 12:13

So these are the actual results. If you want to compare them to budget, we can take the annual budget and spread it month by month. The difficulty is the timing on a month by month basis. It's not an equal annualization of 12 months. We're going to have my understanding a significant amount of the expenses spent early in the year versus later in the year. So we could try to map out that budget on a month to month, but you'll have timing differences, and that's why we chose to go with actual expenses.

Okay, can we get a year to date?



Speaker 1 - 12:45

Yeah, no, I will say on year to date. If we take a year to date budget and compare it to one month activity, you're gonna have a huge variance because you'll have 11 months of activity that hasn't come through yet. So I don't know how meaningful the budget is on a annual to current. If you'd like us to annualize the budget a month to month, we can do that, but again, the timing of those expenses may not run concurrent with that.

To just put a finer point on it, the difficulty is you'll report a month, but we may not have gotten the bills in for that month, and then there's a lag time, and then we're evaluating one month, yet we don't have all the bills. I mean, maybe the better thing to do rather than month to month. I mean, you can always have actuals running, I guess, but you know, at least every quarter or every six months have where it is so that everyone can get a sense of the position this month to month sounds like just. Just a lot of extra work with limited value, but certainly for the purposes of the executive committee and governing board, assuming members are in agreement, at least quarterly, if not semi, annually. Okay, thank you, Alex. All right. Yes. Sorry, Ms. Member of Matayo Bohm.

I would love to suggest a way for us to cut costs. This is about \$60,000 to our budget. Is there any way that we can invest in a QuickBooks and we can do this on our. By us as a committee. Do it ourselves. The Solid Waste Authority.

Well, using it Through a third party actually keeps us. It helps us with regards to the audit and making sure that there's no issues with regards to. Regards to any. Any items that could be an. An audit finding. So we're just. It actually makes sense for us to be able to work through that third party, but we can look at bringing on somebody to be able to just do the accounting. I'm a little confused. What, what. Because each month we have this report. So what. What is the suggestion with QuickBooks, I'm not technically understanding.



Speaker 2 - 15:20

So with QuickBooks you're. If you're able to put in the data, it generates all of this information for you, the revenue, the expenses, et cetera. And, and they could generate the report and it can just be sent out to everyone.



Speaker 1 - 15:30

Well, the days. I guess you're talking about Alyssa or you're talking about Todd. I mean, that's the question. Because we want to make sure this is relatively simple. And I agree with you about reducing costs. Assuming we move forward, it's going to get incredibly complex. Right, right. And we're going to pretty quickly have to undo from QuickBooks. That's 1, 2. I think it may make it harder on the audit process if we're not having them do it. But I just want to understand what we're saying. Are we saying will reduce their workload and turn it to staff because we. Executive committee. I'm not going.

I'm suggesting that to the staff that we have for solid waste authority. So they would do that. And in return, if we have to do an audit, we will use an outside entity to do that audit for us. But I think that this information can be done via QuickBooks. I mean, an investment of 60,000, we can alternate it back to the financial. The folks who are handling the financials to make sure that our books are clean. But for us to get that turnaround information quicker or for us to go into a system to look at it regularly, I think that the \$60,000 can be invested somewhere else. I'm just thinking about ways to cut costs.

Yeah, we all want to cut costs. So I'm just confused because we have one question asking for more information that would be more difficult for staff to do. Right, which was to have the comparison to budget and actuals and monthly.

But that is the question.

It has to be set up and then we have to make sure they're getting it right as opposed to our financial folks. I just want to make sure I Understand the tension here. So I, as the executive director, said he's certainly welcome to look at that and report back to the executive committee. I worry about making sure that folks don't say, todd's cooking the books. Lisa missed something. It didn't go in. We have a professional group that should be overseeing it. I realize it's an expense, but there's a lot of money here, and there's a lot of transparency issues, a lot of trust issues. And so I think it's a great idea, but I worry that we actually invite more headaches. We'll see what the other members think.

But understood, I'm looking for other ways because when I think about the budget that we're using for outreach, a lot of those dollars can. Those dollars we're using can be enhanced to reach more of our community. So just thinking about ways for us to cut costs and spreading those dollars where we truly need it, QuickBooks will generate the information that board member Denise Horland has mentioned and requested, and it is less of a. A

lift. All you have to do is insert our bills, and it generates that information for us.

Uploading the invoices, et cetera. So, again, if there issues around transparency and it will lead to assumptions, then I would scale back on that. But I think in order for us to find innovative ways to cut costs, I welcome another strategy. That's all from me, Mr. Chair.

Thank you. Member Rydell. Yeah. On that item, I don't support bringing anything financial in house. I don't think that would be sound. I think member Mateo Bone is correct in terms of cost saving. Love it. You want to go to the vendor and try to shave off a little off the top in a negotiation. I'm all for that. I don't support bringing in house. I mean, I don't think you would. You're not an accountant, are you? No. I mean, I do for my own law firm, a portion of QuickBooks, and that gets messy. I use outside professionals that are tax professionals with the IRS for accounting purposes and things like that. And with public dollars, we would be remiss to not do that. That's my position. All for saving money.

Okay, so leave it to the executive director to talk to the consultant. Just as a reminder, we approve the contract. We approve the expenses on this for transparency. If there can be savings, obviously we want to invite that. And I'll leave you to contact a vendor and report back to the individual members on that. All right, Any further questions on the accounting? All right, thank you, Alex. Real quick, Chair, I would mention when you have two people within an organization, it's difficult to separate segregation of duties in order to get a clean opinion. It'd be unlikely with only two people doing the accounting function that you would be able to get a clean opinion because there'd be segregation and duty issues with the funds as well as invoicing and doing the banking.

That's generally why organizations will set up with a third party, so they can separate certain functions within the accounting divisions. I think the other issue that you raise on two individuals, one reports to the other, so there's not even a separation of authority. And that leads to potential chaos and issues in the future. Certainly a lack of trust can be easily built on that. Okay, thank you. Outreach and Education Subcommittee.

So important as Broward gets ready to roll out its new master plan for managing the county's waste more efficiently, they've enlisted a powerful new ally, the Florida Panthers. Here's tonight's don't trash our treasure. All right, well, that was excellent. You can continue on the 5000. We'll take this in small chunks.



Speaker 2 - 23:52

Yeah. So the Youth Climate Summit is on February.



Speaker 1 - 23:58

Just recycling. We're going to start doing it. They're talking to a congregation. And this is the game changer for us here in Broward County. The Cats teaming up with Broward Solid Waste Authority to show fans how critical it is to better manage the waste we make. There's 2 million folks that come through this building every year, and that's 2 million opportunities to educate the fan on what best way to sort their materials. Broward, like Miami Dade county, is in the grand grips of a mounting solid waste emergency. South Florida quickly running out of space to landfill our trash. We're in an absolute crisis when it comes to solid waste. We're producing 20,000 pounds of garbage every minute here in Broward county. That's over 10 billion pounds a year.



Speaker 1 - 24:47

Our landfill is at capacity, our waste energy is at capacity, and we're doing a terrible job on recycling and composting. The Cats ready with a clutch assist, ramping up recycling efforts at the Amarin bank arena and launching a composting initiative. We are sorting all of our aluminum, plastic and food waste on event nights. We are currently baling aluminum and cardboard on site. And the Cats are engaging the fans in the stands to do their part, making it super easy for them to sort their waste before just mindlessly throwing it away. We're looking to make some even some signage adjustments, some bin placement adjustments and some better educational opportunities to better inform our fan so they're making the right decision. And data shows this strategy is already paying off. In 2024, we diverted 105 tons of single use plastic, cardboard and aluminum from landfill.



Speaker 1 - 25:46

As of today, we are already ahead of that pace from last year. Right now, composting at the arena is only happening back of house where the food is prepped. But the goal is to also offer food collection bins in the stadium. Understanding that the. The challenge in. In South Florida. South Florida has with waste and then with armed with the knowledge that food waste is the most abundant material in those landfills, how can we lead in finding that solution? Food waste makes up 25% of the trash in landfills, not only taking up space, but spewing heat, trapping methane into the atmosphere at a time when climate change has our planet at a boiling point.



Speaker 1 - 26:30

So in being able to tackle food waste and being able to do in a dedicated way is saving not only the environment, but it's saving really limited capacity of our landfills. Composting is not yet offered countywide in Broward, but is an essential component of the newly drafted Solid Waste Authority's master plan that the county will be presenting to its municipalities come January for approval to take over and streamline all waste management in Broward. The cats taking a lead on this is a very big deal. What's great about this is the Florida Panthers are saying we're not waiting for Broward county to catch up with us. We know this is the right thing to do, not only for the environment, but economically. We're going to be able to make something from this.

So I encourage you, if you all have not looked at the survey or would like to see the survey, to take a closer look. It iust.



Speaker 2 - 32:38

When we invest in our youth, we're investing in our future. And I think this is a low cost of investment, and bringing more individuals to this summit will allow more exposure. And against that, again, that shaming to the parents. So, again, this is some great information, and I have to reiterate. Thank you for all of your hard.



Speaker 1 - 33:00

Work, Lori, and your team member, Shoehan.



Speaker 2 - 33:05

Thank you. I. You might have said it, Lori, but where is the summit? It's at Pompano Beach High School this year on February 6th. Okay, thank you. I'd like to make a motion to approve. I think it's a modest ask and we'll get a huge bang for our park.



Speaker 1 - 33:18

We have a motion by. Number two is our second. Second by member Rydell. Any discussion on that item? All in favor say Aye. Any opposed? Okay. That passes. I want to thank the Education Subcommittee. From the outset of the swa, education has been at the forefront of the discussions. We have not only taken lessons from what Palm beach county does investing heavily every year in a mature system, but we've recognized that we have a lot of ground to make up. And so this innovative effort for relatively low cost, begin that process and to imaginatively look at messaging in a way that changes how we have historically done it and start getting young folks in is a real credit to the Education subcommittee. Its work on trying to find new ways.



Speaker 1 - 34:01

And from the outset, what the members of the executive committee and even the governing board said is we need to get started now. And you all are really delivering on it. So thank you very much and congratulations on that. To the point of the toolkit, we heard some interesting and I think some good comments during the public comments regarding the toolkit, the issue of waste energy and whether that works across demographics, you know, consistency in the psa. There was also another comment that was made to me about the concept of a white paper, which is kind of an academic elite term. It doesn't really translate and can. There's probably other ways of doing that. Individual, I don't know, even task reports doesn't work. Right. But I leave it to the wordsmiths.



Speaker 1 - 34:47

I don't know that white paper really gets us there to really explain how much, I mean, the point of it is how much work, analysis, imagination, intellectual power that was given to it is necessary. The slogan comment that was made is really the real challenge. Right. All our cities struggle with that. From the grass that's greener to whatever else, you know, the sun rises over whatever. So that's going to be the work that everyone's got to do. We really need to button that up, I really think, before we launch this toolkit. And I think that's the real work. Tell me a little bit about what work's been done on the slogan issues.



Speaker 2 - 35:27

So I will remind you that we have some monies for a focus group. The toolkit. The original idea back at the end of the fiscal year, just to bring everyone back, was for you all to have something that you can use to update your colleagues on your commissions now, like December, January, and to that point.



Speaker 1 - 35:47

Not to interrupt, which I just did, but to that point that even the members of the TAC are sitting waiting for this. They recognize the importance even without hearing. All the discussions are asking, when can we have this? So that still remains a priority.



Speaker 2 - 36:01

I think we took it. You know, you asked for a presentation and we really took it. Thank you for meeting those of you that met with me one one and gave me your comments. I hope you see all of your. And I see all of your thoughts in there. Commissioner Ryan on efficiency, Mayor Bright Cruise on the future and our grandkids and kids, we gotta do it for them. I mean, I see all of your comments in our materials, but with that came a very heavy lift in just three short weeks to create eight FAQs for videos and this presentation. I don't we will give you the tagline like we will have it probably next month when we meet with. We move fast, as you see. I don't know if it's worth you holding this up.



Speaker 2 - 36:55

If you want to get on your agendas and I think the discussion or the feedback, I'd love to know is it in a good enough place now and do you have some tweaks that we can make over this next Thanksgiving week while things are slightly quieter so that you're ready to roll in December?



Yeah, that's a really good point. The direction that Mr. Storty gave to everyone was to review and rapidly provide those comments because really the first week of December is where the target had always been. That's one to the TAC is asking for it and they're going to be in December. The current draft of that toolkit has been shared with the tac. They requested it. We asked for their comments at the TAC meeting. So that's in the works. We can emphasize to everyone to get the comments back by next Tuesday or Wednesday if you wish. So we'll send another email out if you have any other suggestions and to the public as well. We heard some great suggestions today. So we need, need to do that.



Speaker 1 - 37:57

With respect to getting it on the agendas, that's a separate issue, but that the focus has got to be to give you the information, the suggestions to tweak it and get us in a final footing for the first, second week in December. Is that, is that consistent with what you're asking?



Speaker 2 - 38:12

It is. And also know that this is going to evolve. Right. So in February, we want to give you an updated presentation that covers cost analysis or whatever information you all are moving through. You know, we want to have these so that you have them through the end of the year updated at minimum on a quarterly basis, if not more than that. We can do it anytime. So it's not like one and done. You know, we're going to create more videos. We're going to be doing more outreach on the public side. This really was meant for you all, the League of Women Voters, some of our advocates that are out there giving presentations, hoas. We have people asking at your level for this now. So that's my comment.



Speaker 1 - 38:57

And I would note that you all also met with the PIOs to get their Input. I heard about that meeting was very productive. There were a lot of good ideas that came out of that, which was an aggressive effort on your part as well. So everyone's been engaged. That does not mean, as you said, one and done. We're going to find messages that work better, things that resonate. We'll hear from the community. The tagline will, you know, maybe we're not. We're not funding swag, so we're not as concerned about changing that. We have to change our shirts or change from Broward county to whatever you guys were going to possibly call us. I know you weren't, so.



Speaker 1 - 39:37

But the point is, the idea is coming in and maybe, you know, maybe that's an opportunity to invite the public on a kind of competitive basis to say, come up with the tagline, bash the trash, whatever it is. Start making suggestions of what. Of what we can do.



Speaker 2 - 39:52

Yes. What we're not going to sound like is everybody else, though, with trash talk and all the, you know, slogans that are used over and over again because we're just going to get lost in the noise.



Speaker 1 - 40:03

I agree.



Speaker 2 - 40:03

Yeah.



Speaker 1 - 40:04

Okay. Any questions on communications, outreach and the toolkits? Suggestions? I think everybody's been weighing in. Member Mataya bone.



Speaker 2 - 40:11

Thank you, Mr. Chair. The only thing that I would add is during our conversation, we talked about hard to reach populations, and that was our seniors. And so as we continue to engage our communities, let's be sure to ensure that we have language for our seniors who are. Who may not understand the urgency of this issue and making sure that they get this information out to them in a way that's accessible. They can't always come to us, so we have to find creative ways to get that information to them. Thank you, Mr. Chair.



Speaker 1 - 40:46

That's an excellent point. As we've said from the beginning. Right. One thing government does well is tell you how you should learn. What we don't do well is understand how people actually learn. And it's across many different communities. And I think one area aside from either culturally specific or gender specific is also the fact that the commercial market doesn't understand fully. Right. You look at the number office buildings that do zero recycling. There's no pickup. It's complicated. They don't really make it a priority. We have a lot of work to do on the SWA side of that. Those are big producers. So we have to make sure we're also fashioning messages. That's why, you know, what the Panthers are doing or city furniture or other big players. And Smaller ones are doing to show the economics of it.



Speaker 1 - 41:31

Is this entirely separate message about the economic viability of meeting the paramount social policy?



Speaker 2 - 41:39

Yes, and I will. And I'm giving this update at governing board because that's where the PIO update fell. But just touch on it briefly, you, chair Ryan in September said we should know where the messaging deserts, I think you called it, are in each of our cities. This is one of the things we tasked the PIOs with. They gave us some good information. But the two calls to action yesterday. See, the reason why public outreach doesn't work a lot of the time is because it's blanketed. The slogan's going to be great, we'll use it. But when it's effective, we're tailoring messaging for seniors. That's coming from a senior. I'm not going and telling them you're.



Speaker 1 - 42:23

Not going and telling them I am, definitely. I appreciate that you just lost all credibility entirely. Especially when I think the reference was to the gray hair needing to change.



Speaker 2 - 42:35

I meant elected. I meant it's so much more powerful when it comes from. From a pier. So the two calls to action that came that we, that I asked for yesterday was cities. Give me the geographic boundary because we can mail to that. We have this mailing budget coming up. Let's mail to those places first because we know they might not be digitally connected. That's why they're usually in a messaging desert. And the next thing we asked for was. Tell us, thinking of your hard to reach population. Tell, tell us who the community influencers are in your cities. These are the people I want to do videos and things with. The pastors, the nonprofit leaders, people they recognize and know and trust. Let's have a conversation with them, see if they're into what we're doing here and they agree with.



Speaker 2 - 43:26

We all need to work together to fix this. And if they do, let's have them help us spread our message. You know, be part of our congregation. So that's our formula basically, and it's.



Speaker 1 - 43:39

An important formula moving forward. This is, as you said, this is not a mission accomplished. Once you identify the effective ways to communicate to the messaging deserts have metrics on that and do right. That's got to be

sustained over the next 30, 40 years because it is a constant. The messaging deserts are constantly repopulated, if you will. So this is important foundational work. It's heavy lift, it's a big investment, but it needs to be constantly upgraded vigilantly.



Speaker 2 - 44:05

Correct.



Speaker 1 - 44:07

All right, any other comments, questions thank you so much.



Speaker 2 - 44:10

You're welcome.



Speaker 1 - 44:10

Okay. All right, C and D commercial recycling subcommittee update. Mr. Storty, we had this C and E commercial subcommittee meeting on Tuesday. We went through a number of different things, especially with regard to the fact that the county and member Mead and myself went to Lee county last Friday and so toured their program, got input from an insight on their C and D and commercial process. Some of that was shared in the email that was sent out earlier, but it was through numerous discussions that day. There is a desire to be able to move that forward. All right, that is something that can be done. Now we've heard from the industry, we've heard from a number of different community members on why that can't, why can't cnd, why can't commercial recycling happen?



Speaker 1 - 44:58

Almost immediately in your packet there was a letter that was developed in coordination with member Meade to be distributed by their planning and building department for any new applications for projects to suggest it wasn't really, it isn't something that is mandated, but something to suggest to be able to use, send that material to a recycling facility. And on the backside of that letter is a number of the facilities that are identified in the subtitle in the white paper. 17. With that, they are distributing that as new applications come into their planning department to encourage them to use the C and D, then the recycling services, the C and D and commercial recycling services. That's in process. But we've heard from the industry, we've heard from a number of concerned groups within the community.



And as you know, based on the waste characterization study, this is one of the low hanging fruits that we can actually go after. We can go. That we can go after very easily. So with that, the subcommittee asked for SCS to come up with a proposal to help us move that forward to bridge the gap between the county and the cities to develop a phased approach that we can actually start working towards innovation, implementing a C and D in a commercial program. There's a number of different thoughts with regards to how to move that forward. This was something that was discussed at the TAC meeting also on Monday. We understand maybe the phase timeline that was presented maybe is a little aggressive and we want to be able to work through that.



Speaker 1 - 46:36

One of the reasons that we're going to be having a TAC meeting on December 15, hopefully with enough participation, is to start working through that challenge and understanding those concerns from each of the communities and the TAC members on how to be able to move the C and D commercial recycling forward. Now with regards to the SCS proposal. And let me just slow down before we get there. So first of all, to the subcommittee, to member Meade and yourself. Thank you for going to Lee County. The information that was provided in the backup, the PowerPoint was very, you know, it's very compelling. We've known about this, we've all been talking about it. You know, when we say low hanging fruit, let's be really clear what we're talking about is the heaviest, largest tonnage that goes to landfill, that is the most recyclable.



Speaker 1 - 47:21

And the executive committee and the governing board have instructed us to move forward on it. So I thank you for doing that. Again, not waiting for the master plan. We need, we need to move forward on it and we need to start, you know, the messaging effort. I commend the idea of the letter going to the, whatever your departments are called, Building department, planning department. I think it's a great idea and we should. I invite all the members to take a look at the letter that has been drafted and get with your individual departments. It costs you nothing to provide this information on existing capacity to do it. And then we can work with the industry to find out what impact that has had. Obviously, the ordinances is an entirely different issue to the county.



Speaker 1 - 48:07

I had a discussion with Mr. Kelleher and I want to thank the county because the county has made clear and made clear at the subcommittee meeting, they're ready to go. If we can put together with industry and we can get the recommendation, they're happy to do the ordinance. We have to work through the issues in our individual cities. I would say at this point, no matter what's happened to get us here, at this point, any slowdown is on us. The county's ready to pull the trigger on that and move forward on it. We need to do that work. And so I thank the subcommittee.



Speaker 1 - 48:40

It's going to now require each of the members to really look at this, get with your city managers and your department heads to make sure that the TAC is moving forward to understand the work that needs to be done on this. And the TAC is interested in moving forward on this. They've been tasked for a meeting coming up at the last meeting to begin looking at the Lee county aggressively. They've been given this information and so separate apart from we'll talk about the proposal because I think it is going to require a report. It's going to require some real

recommendation, real thinking, but we need to move quickly on this. So I thank the subcommittee for doing that. Now, SES is here to talk about their proposal. Yes. No. Are they online? No, SES isn't here.



Speaker 1 - 49:22

But Travis from RRS should be online to be able to go through the proposal. But real quick, I'd like to be able to hear from member.



Speaker 2 - 49:29

Yes, Member Horlan, very quick. Much. Thank you, Mr. Chair. Much to your point, I just want to remind everyone this letter was sent out. But one of the most important things about this on the back, there are a list of 10 alternate disposal facilities of Broward county that are now ready and able to accept the C and D. So again, to the chair's point, I want to hit it home with all of you and the governing board to make sure that we're touching base with our city managers of the chair Fed and building officials to make sure that this list is being provided. Thank you.



Speaker 1 - 49:59

Thank you, Member Horland. I think what we should do is for the next meeting, let's report back the individual cities that are utilizing this correspondence. I want to see the. I think we all want to see what the impact is the start of it, and then be able to be evaluate with the help of the industry. Are they seeing. Going to be a lag time between the messaging and when there's data generated. But we have to begin somewhere. So what I'd like to do is encourage all the members to look at this letter. Remember, Horla, thank you for the work. You're absolutely right. The industry's been saying, hey, we're here, ready and available right now. We don't have the carrots and sticks to do it, but let's start at least the messaging that it's coming. Great point. Okay.



Speaker 1 - 50:38

Okay, real quick, could you bring Travis up on the swing? Travis, overview on the proposal. Real quick. Wait, hold on. We're getting you. You're muted either on our end or your end. Okay. Travis, are you mute? He's got a monster headset, though. Say that. I know he can hear us. He's laughing. Hold on. Yeah, well, we're going through this. I'll just. So with regards to. The proposal is for SCS and the team to help us develop C and D and recycling, C and D and commercial recycling programs. That's to be able to work. The proposal is to be able to understand the challenges at the county level in each of the cities that each of the member cities there's.



Speaker 1 - 52:01

And we need to be able to coordinate this in a way that we can be able to roll out a very similar program throughout the entire community. Their assistance to be able to understand where we are with that process, understand what the county is been able to do, what the county has looked at already. Help the county with regards to maybe the various issues, especially with direct haul of C and D material to a landfill or of the waste energy facilities or the waste energy facility. Sorry. And how we would like to be able to roll that out with regards to if it's something that is a deposit program or if there's some type of fee that's paid at the end, similar to what Lee county has. If one of the certified facilities wasn't utilized along with that, how is the facility become certified?



Speaker 1 - 52:47

Is there a process that goes through that? How can we make sure that they are, if they are one of these CND processors, that they are diverting at least 50% of the inbound structure that comes in so that coordination and be able to do that in a very timely manner. Was the proposal that was developed and sent out with regard from SCS to be able to get that done in very timely matter. Because the goal would be to be able to work with TAC and try to stand this, stand these both of these programs up as soon as possible. And that means even before possibly approval of the solid, the master plan and the facilities amendment, we could roll these things out now.



Speaker 1 - 53:26

Now, with that, if, you know, I'm not trying to say anything bad here, but if this didn't roll forward the solid waste Authority, this is something that each of your cities can do now. This is something that can happen already. The industry has asked for this to happen a number of years ago and has. And in the meantime, we've actually been plowing more into the hill, as they say, or bringing it to the waste energy facility. Instead of diverting these materials, they're ready to take the material. It requires us to look at a number of different options to be able to present to the cities and the county and in essence to ban direct haul of C and D to the landfill or the recycling facility. Very simple things.



Speaker 1 - 54:11

And especially because unlike Lee county, that when they rolled their program out, they didn't have anything. They didn't have any third parties. They didn't have any other C and D processors. So they stood up their own facility first. Over the time frame, other service providers in the county have developed their own C and D facilities. And now the C and D facility at the county that's at the county facility is really a C and D facility of last resort. That's not their business. They've actually increased the Price there to kind of drive the material to the other third party processors. Because the focus is more with regards to the various recycling streams and their operation of the landfill and the C and D and the waste energy facility that's owned by Lee County.



Speaker 1 - 54:57

So that proposal is what's in front of you today for discussion and approval so that we can keep moving that forward in coordination with TAC and understanding and then CND subcommittee. Denise, did I miss anything there? Okay, thank you. Spot on from the committee. Travis, can we hear you again? Destin, can you hear me? Now? Just before you start, I want to thank Clay. He's had to overcome a lot this morning. Let's all give him a round of applause. And Roy as well. All right, thank you. We are nothing without you guys. All right, Travis, floor's yours. Good morning, executive committee. Sorry for the technical difficulties, everybody. Got me now. Thumbs up. Okay, maybe a little louder for folks, but go ahead. All right, so, yeah, Todd did a great job of it. Touch that screen.



Speaker 1 - 55:45

Todd did a great job giving an overview of the proposal. Again, this was asked to be provided to you all. I will also add that the state statutes in Florida do give the ability for us to move in this direction. And there are other municipalities within the state, beyond just Lee county, that have implemented ordinances as well as those outside of Florida. And so we look forward to progressing on this work. We're available for any questions you might have

about the proposal that was sent out. Again, it will cover both C and D recycling as well as mandatory commercial recycling, which is definitely something that we need to move forward with. Travis, what other counties in Florida have moved forward in some fashion or iteration of Lee County? Sarasota county and Palm beach county both have pretty good C and D programs.



Speaker 1 - 56:35

They approach it differently. Those are the ones that come to mind in Florida. Lee County, I think, is one that would be a good model for you all to look at. But we'll get into that as part of the work that we'll be doing and in partnership with the tac. I think what's critical here for you all is given that there is the authority, doesn't have the authority to implement and actually enforce an ordinance. It would have to come from the county and then each of the respective municipalities. So finding something that can work for everyone and have a template that then they can adopt through their unique processes I think is going to be critical. And something that we can try to enforce and administer evenly across all the jurisdictions is going to be critical with that.



Speaker 1 - 57:13

I do think that on the commercial side, you've got Sarasota County, Lee County, Collier county, city of Orlando, Alachua county, city of Northport, all have had mandatory commercial recycling ordinances, and some for quite some time. So, again, this is something that's being done in other places and it has been proven to increase their recycling rates. Okay. As I understand it, there's a proposal. Explain the outline of the proposal, comprise all the members, and I'll open up for questions. Sure. So as part of the proposal, we've got a project management component. There's also the ordinance development, so that's developing the ordinance language, the definitions, requirements, standards. With that, you know, the applicability criteria, you know, where there would be potential exemptions. Within those, we're also looking at establishing performance metrics and diversion targets.



Speaker 1 - 58:11

As Todd mentioned, with the C and D component, there might be a need to have some certification process in place for those private entities that are already operating and doing a good job recovering C and D. But to make sure that everyone's on a level playing field with that, we're going to look at compliance verification. You know, what's the implication to the county and the cities in regards to how would they administer the program and enforce the program? You know, what are their respective costs to do? That would be something that we would estimate. And there's also assistance with public messaging implementation strategies as well.



Speaker 1 - 58:43

As part of that, my understanding in terms of the timeline is that you would predict you'd be able to have all of this work done by when I think we've got it in the proposal to conclude in March. I know that both teams that are involved, which this would be, SES and rrs, are really ready to jump on this with our staff to make it a top priority. I think the key is going to be having that quality engagement with the TAC and really figuring out where the rubber meets the road with implementation within each of the cities. And in regards to getting our portion of the work, the technical specifications, our recommendations on how to proceed, we should be well aligned to do that timeline that I just said to get through all this very quickly. All right.



Speaker 1 - 59:22

Before I open up to the members, when I open up to the county, to our vice chair, I'll just say, I mean, the county's been ready to go on this. I think. I think we've been waiting to see if this is the way that SWA wanted to go. We think it's a good idea. We think it's a good way to go. And for us to be able to stand up a facility at the Broward County Landfill. Obviously, you need flow control because you're not going to build an entire facility. But the fact is there's a lot of alternative places for this to go.



Speaker 1 - **59:54** 

So what I think what I'm looking to see is all the details that are needed for lawyers so that I can put the ordinance through, and I'm ready to do it as soon as we've got it right to that point. You know, it seems while Lee county had a build with a clean slate and they had their own difficulties and challenges, we have different but similar challenges. The fact that Lee county has the guts of nords does not simply mean we can copy and paste. It's so much more complicated for us, and the TAC understands that. I think in terms of the last meeting of what the mandate has been from the Executive committee, you know, part of this process, and welcome the industry that has existing capacity.



Speaker 1 - 01:00:41

But one thing that this Executive committee, the governing board and the SWA as a whole has always focused on is making sure we have an eye towards our ability to eventually control that infrastructure. Destiny, if the opportunity presents. And for the county, it's been impossible to implement this without flow control. Even if you were to bring in an operator, you build it and bring in an operator, you still have to have the commitment of flow control. So the work of the SWA.



Speaker 2 - 01:01:10

You.



Speaker 1 - 01:01:10

Know, irrespective of, let's say, what happens in 2026 on this issue is a game changer for this county. And we must keep moving forward, I think, as rapidly as possible to get this. The CD subcommittee is working so hard on this, traveling around the state, gathering data. And we have the county in the position saying, we're ready to go. If you guys can work out the details and to get the cities on board within the swa, including those that are not participating in the swa, then we have the capacity to begin implementing this. And the idea that there's a timeline as early as March, although I prefer February to have a report back to say, what do we need? There are few priorities within the SWA right now, beyond education, that are as important as what the work here to be done.

And we've all been saying this for more than a year. And so I thank RS and scs, the county's worth, the tac, and most especially the subcommittee for pushing this forward, because that's the prompt we needed. Member

Suham.



Speaker 2 - 01:02:18

Thank you, Chair. First, I really want to thank Board member Mead. I think it's a great letter. It's a great idea. And you know, just to take this initiative and give us this model is really great. I think that we've talked about this as low hanging fruit for a long time. It's so critical. And, and the only question I have, Travis, is when you're talking about who is going to participate at the TAC level, sure, that's all of our public works waste experts within our own cities that are being invited. But it seems also that you should have building, not, maybe not building officials, but experts in the application process for planning and development so that they can participate and where in their process this would be most effective and most efficient.



Speaker 2 - 01:03:12

So I would just suggest that we not limit it to those involved in our disposal process. The other thing I would say is that although you can't copy Lee Counties, and we know that it's complex, we're not starting from scratch. And so I think that we should be able to move quickly tweak based on the input that you're getting from these experts. And although this is a not to exceed \$150,000 proposal, I think that you will be able to do it much more efficiently and much more cost effectively than \$150,000. So with that, I make a motion to approve.

While I have the microphone open, I'm glad that TAC has been engaged. I've been asking for that for a while. I think one of the most critical things here we have the framework for an ordinance. We talked about this in our meeting the other day. We're really looking for SES to flesh out the language with legal and with looking through you for implementation guidelines. But I think the most critical point about this process, especially when engaging tac, is the member franchise agreements and how there could potentially be complications with that. So I think that, you know, the ordinance, the draft ordinance is there. I think it just needs, you know, some fleshing out. But we really need to look at those franchise agreements. Thank you, Travis.



Speaker 1 - 01:04:52

To member Horland's point, as we have encountered previously, we may need Mr. Cole to weigh in and get us, particularly as folks have either existing or contracts that are coming due, to make sure we have the language in there. We're really on it. And I know you've provided that language for other contracts. It's an excellent point. Synchronizing 31 cities with different agreements is a major challenge that Lee did not have. So number four, I guess, obviously, since it's going to be a county ordinance, so we need to include our two lawyers on this. Of course. We would net. We would never count out the county lawyers. The financial position of the Broward SWA had total assets of the 4 million 183 of which 2 million are associated with those member receivables cash and cash equivalents of 2,000,175. The net equity position of the authority is a little under \$4,000,000. 3,920,000 for the month activity. We do show the member assessments as accrued revenue hasn't received yet in cash. Approximately \$150,000 of exchange expenditures leaves a net revenue for the month of a million. Eight. 51. Any questions? Okay, Alex, during the executive committee meeting this morning, there was a request to try to provide at least quarterly updates on actual budget comparisons. And as I understand it, you all have committed to do that so that the members will be able to see that in real time, correct? Yeah, we certainly can do that.

I think we discussed on a month to month budget analysis, there's significant variances and it's a bit noisy on a month to month, but a quarterly budget to actual makes sense and we can provide that. Second, the executive committee made clear through the subcommittee that tackling message deserts is a key component that is reaching aspects of the community that maybe, you know, don't learn through the water bill or don't have a digital footprint.

Whether it's the League of Women Voters, the Sierra Club, the school board and others in the community that can provide the messaging that helps all of you. And then lastly the engagement directly with the your public information officers in the cities. You'll hear an update on this.

But one of the directions from the Education subcommittee and the Executive Committee was to make sure to engage each city and their PIOs to understand where are the messaging deserts. What themes seem to work broadly and more specifically within their own cities to be able to be responsive to individual city needs. We've been working very closely with Lori and her team having one ones making sure those materials Again, are palatable to our communities. We've also amplified a hyper focus on our youth.

So based on the discussions that we've been having in our current, our most recent discussion in regards to how we can engage our youth, we have put funds aside to support the Youth Class Climate Summit that's happening February 6th at Pompano Beach High School where we will have a component around recycling, a curriculum dedicated to how to recycle correctly. And to address our waste issue, we also conducted a survey to our teachers to ensure that this information isn't tone deaf, like do they have the capacity to really implement a lot of this information within their structured lessons or curriculum? And there's a need and want for that. And so we had discussed helping create a curriculum to work alongside the current curriculum currently happening with the school board.

We also have been, we have a website, www.browardrecycle.org where all of this information housed and we'll continue amplifying it across our social medias. And we're asking folks on the governing board to continue doing that as well. And if the PIOs are not engaged, there is opportunities for them to be engaged. There was a PIO meeting yesterday. There's two upcoming meetings happening in February 19th and the last one that's happening May 20th first. And lastly, I'll end with this. There is a strong emphasis on using community voices and influencers in a lot of our campaigns. And you will start seeing us really targeting specific demographics with popular voices in our community. So senior, get a senior voice with our youth, get a youth influencer and so on. And someone. And so I'm very proud of what this committee has been able to accomplish.

I started off with four questions. I asked the PIOs, how much waste do we generate per minute in Broward county? Someone said £10. And I'm not laughing, because that is, I mean, we're in government.



Speaker 2 - 01:39:30

So that for me was like, huh, Yep, okay, we're on the right track here. So went through the four questions. What's our recycling rate? You know, someone said 10, someone said close to 30. So I was like, yep, you're close.39. So it was a really healthy dialogue and we did ask for those two key pieces back. Where are your messaging deficits in your community? And who are some of your community champions that we can lean on to help reach those people? Because government telling people what to do and a real failed approach. You know, I think we're all in this business to drive strategy, drive policy and do the right thing. Who the message is coming from is just as important as what the message is. And that was the key takeaway. And we got a lot of good feedback.



Speaker 2 - 01:40:23

Like one person wrote back to me, hey, we did that with the census outreach and it really worked. We saw an increase. So I'm going to leave it there. Any questions about the PIO meetings member Matteo Bowman mentioned? We will have one on February 19 and May 21.



Speaker 1 - 01:40:44

The only thing I would say is to each of the members, the fact that there's a meeting February 19th doesn't mean the PIOs have nothing to do between now and then. No, let's be really clear about that. And we have to drive that issue to make sure that you're getting the constant feedback. It's a challenge to get all the PIOs together, but they need to be working. And the timeline we have for responses from the members PIOs and the public really is over the next 10 days to two weeks, so that we're finalizing those toolkits for, particularly for the dais, but more broadly. Member Coburn.



Speaker 2 - 01:41:21

Yes, Just a question on the PIO meeting. I think it's great that we are meeting with the PIOs. I know in our city there are other individuals that are probably the ones who will be doing the outreach, not our PIOs, necessarily, where they might be assisting them with preparing information. And they need to know this. But they're not necessarily our outreach individuals. So when you say you have a PIO meeting, should we be inviting other individuals to the meeting? It's not strictly for PIOs, is it?



Speaker 1 - 01:42:02

No, the PIOs is because that's the point of contact for all of us. We can't invite everybody and just say show up or don't show up. We have required really a response from the PIOs. It's up to the individual cities, some 10 cities, the PIO is responsible for organizing how that goes out. Other cities, it may be more diffused. It's up to the individual PIOs to make that call. Everybody's invited, but we can't put the consultant in the position of trying to keep that list, it's going to be up to the individual members. We have the PIO contacts. That's been the direction of the executive committee. So if an individual city has three or four people that handle it in different ways, please, by all means have them attend.

So it's for the city to decide who their outreach person will be to really see sent to that meeting. Yes. Okay. Thank you.

And I will mention this toolkit I know we're going to talk about it really meant for you all at this juncture. One of the key pieces of feedback we got, if you remember, we did a survey with the PIOs that led into this at the last of the fiscal year and they gave us their dates. They all have like printed, not all of them, but a lot of them have their

printed newsletter going out in January. So they're getting their own toolkit from my team for their messaging like on or around December 1st to meet those deadlines. So we're hitting it from that angle. But they'll get their own messaging that's public facing. Does that make sense? Okay. All right, onto the toolkit. So I thought I'd step through a few of the materials with you today.

I first, before I even want to start, I want to thank those of you who had one one sessions with me and took me up on that offer. It was very helpful. I want to thank the E and O subcommittee for the direct feedback we get so we don't dance around for an hour. And then I also just want to thank the technical team, Daniel and Travis, they stepped through them. We did our own presentation today them so everyone really fed into these. This is not my team alone, you know, this is a village. All right, let's so member. Don wanted a PSA in addition to the flow control video that vice chair for. Hear that? Every minute that goes by, we create approximately 20,000 pounds of waste in Broward County.

Most of it ends up in the landfill or a waste to energy plant. And we're running out of space for it to go. Together we can change that. The more we recycle and take out of our waste stream, the healthier, cleaner community we create for all of us. Learn more@browardrecycles.org Hear that Every minute. That that was the first psa. And then we did this was actually Travis's idea. I think he said do one with a kid voice. So this is actually my coworker's, our creative dresser. Wouldn't it be nice if our Trash just disappeared.

When our waste leaves our curbs, if we don't store it correctly, it ends up at a landfill or the waste to energy plant. And here's the deal. We're running out of spades.




Was not budgeted by the way, since I know there's a lot of concern over fiscal responsibility.

Okay, thank you.



All right, so now we'll watch the longer form and this I think the idea and correct me if I'm wrong, was that an elected could watch this about flow control before maybe. Here in Broward county we are generating 20,000 pounds of waste per minute and that number will. It's okay, you can fly it. I'll shut up. Will continue to rise as our population increases. Yet we are recycling only 39% of our waste, falling far short of the state's 75% goal. Our waste to energy plant is at capacity and our in county landfill is nearing capacity. Today, 75% of what gets buried or burned in Broward county could be recovered. Together, we can change the journey of our waste or flow control. So what is flow control? It's like traffic control, but for trash.



Just like traffic lights guiding cars where they go, flow control guides waste where it should go, whether it's recycling centers, compost sites or safe disposal facilities. Instead of each city going its own way, the master plan will connect all of us to solve our waste crisis. Because when we work together, good things happen. The master plan offers five different paths or scenarios we could take. The authority is recommending scenario A on the on this path, the authority will use existing waste and recycling facilities already in the county while planning to build three new transfer stations and eight permanent drop off centers to collect things like electronics, household hazardous waste and bulk items. When the county and the cities share resources and streamline operations, we

improve efficiency. It protects our future and increases our recycling and reuse rates.



Speaker 2 - 01:47:31

Flow control helps sort and recover valuable materials that we could use locally. It keeps rates fair. One coordinated system means better contracts and stable costs over time. And it builds trust and transparency because residents can see that Broward's valuable waste is being managed safely and responsibly. Flow control keeps our waste and our community moving in the right direction toward recovery, toward recycling, toward a brighter future for all of Broward County. So I'll pause there. Do you want me to just roll through it? Okay, so I'm gonna. We created. We ended up with eight FAQs. I think the intention was to have like three when we started, but the feedback we got, it just made sense while were in it to do it that way. Everyone had something that resonated with them. But I'll just show the top five top points.



Speaker 2 - 01:48:30

We're in a waste crisis. Broward county is growing. More people equals more trash. Our waste has value. We're literally throwing away valuable things that have value. We can't afford to wait, and we must work together to fix it. So these are your top five. If you're in a pinch, you're running into a meeting. Grab that good taste. Go. Now, I'm actually going to take a break and I'm going to turn it over to my colleague Haley. I'm going to go run it. She's going to take you through the presentation. Okay. So if only our trash just. We have a plan. And if only our trash just disappeared when we put it outside. Next slide. Instead, we're faced with a crisis. When your garbage leaves your curb, it doesn't just disappear.



Speaker 2 - 01:49:37

It ends up at a waste to energy facility or the landfill, both of which are at capacity or nearing capacity. So what we're doing right now is not working well. When our garbage has no place to go, we sacrifice our clean communities. We increase pollution and risk health impacts, and it will be too late for our kids and our grandkids to fix it. So just how much garbage are we talking about? Well, in Broward county, we generate 10.6 billion pounds a year. That's approximately 20,000 pounds of waste a minute. And let's not forget, the county is growing. More people equals more waste that we must manage, and it has to go somewhere. So what can we do? We have to work together. 28 towns and cities, including ours, plus the county, have developed a master plan.



Speaker 2 - 01:50:40

We've studied our current waste stream and looked at all the options available. And per the master plan, there are no new landfills or waste energy facilities planned in the county. The master plan presents options to decrease the amount of valuable waste we are sending to disposal. In fact, about 75% of our waste could be diverted with the right programs in place. So what's the benefit for our city or town? Well, it keeps our community clean and healthy. It helps mitigate flooding by lowering methane emissions from landfills, which helps decrease sea level rise. We know waste has value and that we're literally Throwing away valuable materials that we could use later locally and

create jobs here at home. The longer we wait to fix it, the more expensive the solutions get. And let's not forget, as we've been talking, how many more pounds have accumulated.



Speaker 2 - 01:51:34

And of course they deserve better. Our kids, our grandkids, and so do we. But we can't solve the crisis alone. And being a member has benefits like shared resources, streamlined operations, improved efficiency, stabilize costs, consistent diversion programs, and the outreach to residents and businesses to teach them how to do this correctly. Everyone can do something, and together we can solve this crisis. What are our next steps? In February, the updated presentation with financial modeling will be available. In March, the governing board votes to adopt the master plan and recommend the facilities amendment. Moving into April and June, we'll have our outreach to cities. In July, the deadline for cities to approve the facilities amendment. And the big one, August 2026, deadline for master plan adoption to continue. Dialect thank you. Okay.

Absolutely. As well, we talked about the influencers and also the, you know, outreach folks that we know within our cities. So at some point we'll know the timing on identifying those folks. Is that okay? Also, completely agree on the language terms. I'm shocked with highly intelligent people who just don't know. I'll tell you, just to admit ignorance. I'm seeing plastic bottles with lids in this video and I always understood you have to take the lid off that doesn't recycle. The plastic bottle. Recycle. So now I'm questioning everything because I'm thinking, did I get that wrong? So, you know, I consider myself a very environmentally aware person.

Lots to learn still, but just an example. And then this might be a loaded question, but tax reform, that's looming to me. That's one of my biggest challenges in bringing this forward. And we don't know what's going to happen. We're doing a lot in our city to educate so people understand what I think this group understands the reality of what that tax reform could mean. But I know we've talked about it a little bit and I'm sorry if I missed something, but will we be armed with some. And I know we don't really know at this point entirely. Right. Well, we don't. So maybe I just leave that out there because I know it's a loaded Question. But those were some comments and questions I had. Thank you.

One, two. I think every city assesses trash costs outside the ad valorem, so it has no impact in that regard. While there may be cost issues, there's going to be a task paper coming forward on the broad issues of what the expected costs will be. Be something that you'll have in the. In the coming months prior to approval.

But even those things that you just stated would be helpful. I think those are great points and rattling those off. I think it would be helpful to us. Fair enough.

And I'm sure there's folks who have better ideas than what I just stated, but that was just an effort. Real quick. Remember Rikers? Did you want to address that? Yeah, just really quick. I'll be really quick. Interesting that you should bring up the cap of the bottle because I was of the same mindset as you and about, I don't know, three or four months ago, I did another tour of the revolution, recycle. And that's actually one of the things that's recently changed is you can recycle the caps. It was more of a danger thing of popping off, but they've gotten past that, so they're recycling caps. But I think the bigger point there is that the world is constantly changing. The things that we can recycle are constantly changing.

And so this education, to your point, you said earlier, has to keep going and going, but it is absolutely.

That's another thing. It's just the continuous communication. People have to hear things. Right. I think the studies say at least five times. One last thing is I just want to apologize for being delayed to the executive committee meeting. My father was the priority this morning unexpectedly. So thank you.

That's better. Member, for just whispered in my ear to address your cost issue that if all else fails, the county. County will pay for it all. All right. Member Shuham.

Thank you, Chair. I mean, for me, really just a simple compliment. I think that, you know, all of us bring to our cities different strengths and this participation in the Solid Waste Authority has been, you know, massive undertaking. I feel fine speaking for all of us. It's just been a huge effort. But the work of this outreach and education committee is amazing. And really just to thank you because I Have been struggling with trying to wrap my head around this, and we've been sitting here for over a year, and I just feel like now I can. And a lesson in why we hire professionals. So thank you, Laurie, and your team. I think it's fantastic, and I'm sure that there'll be tweaks along the way and everything else, but I. I really, literally felt a weight lift off my shoulders.

And whether there's a member missing or not, you're always a powerful voice and have taken up additional responsibility within the subcommittee.

It was an oversight by staff, and I apologize. Member Rydell. Thank you, Mr. Chair. First of all, great job. I knocked it in the park. You know, I bring this up at the executive committee in election years, right? So these are going to be hard fiscal decisions that if we don't start inundating our respective colleagues now with this information, is a lost cause. Years and years of just the amount we've all read and digested gone to waste. So I say it more as a call to action today.

Every city has a different dynamic. Some commissions or councils may already be well on their way to approving this. They understand already for whatever reason, others may not and may need as, you know, kind of weather vain as to what the community feels. That's up to the individual members of the governing board that you are the ambassadors, you understand your cities most and therefore have to work within what's been provided. But to be clear, Lori and her team are available to assist on that.

So if an individual member says look, I need X, that's not necessarily having to be generated, but they have within their toolkit to provide you and then that happens. It's a collaboration and it is extra work for each of the governing board members to be able to have to work with staff and say what's going to be most effective. You know, talk to the commission councils before the decision making points have to be made and be able to do that. The good thing is that we're continuing to craft not only the messaging but the best ways to engage. So that's an extra point.

To that point, the TAC meeting last week, just to give a quick report on that, since that was raised here were the cities that attended. It was short notice so don't take in non attendance as an indication of the lack of engagement. It was short noticed and there's another meeting coming up and I'll give you that Broward County, Davie, Lauderdale Lakes, Miramar, Oakland Parkland Plantation, Sunrise and Southwest Ranches. The issue the toolkit was specifically discussed with the tac. It was indicated that the TAC is also to review that and get back the information. The next meeting is on December 15th. There's other issues that we'll talk about that they need to cover. But the TAC was very clearly there, and there's almost no reason to hold a meeting if Ralph isn't here, because he's always here.

So it's getting the word out.

Committee, I applaud you so much for going out. It's the outreach that really gets us.



Speaker 1 - 02:06:58

To where we need to be. So I'm in it to win it. All right. Additionally, the consultant and the subcommittee will be working to develop a tagline, a theme, whatever you want to call, they're working through that'll be forthcoming and it'll evolve over time and it may actually depend on again, the message deserts that we're talking to. But you're welcome to give that some thought. One of the things that the consultants made clear, we're not going to use the kind of trite, you know, trash talking or things like that because you just get lost. Nobody really looks at it anymore. So. Member Fer. Thank you. Thank you. Nice job on all this. I do have a couple issues and I look at the five talking points.



Speaker 1 - 02:07:46

If I'm going in front of a commission, I know one of the main things that someone's going to want to know about is the cost. And I think we need to be having that right up front. And I think the way to talk about that is as a collective, if we're doing a contract together, we're going to be asking for most favored nation contracts. And that means that whoever's in this group, we're going to get the best price and nobody can get a price lower than that. That means a lot because if somebody says we're not, we're gonna, we're not going to join right now. We're going to wait and see if we can get a better deal. They're not going to get a better deal.



Speaker 1 - 02:08:28

And I, and, and I, I think when you, when we have our global agreement right now with Wheelbrider, that's part of the agreement. When we have a future agreement with Waste Management at the state of the art Recycle center, we're the ones who are going to dictate that price. Ideally we go in with Miami Dade and do those together and say, you know what these two counties are going to do everything, that we're going to have the most favored nation clause. That to me is a big selling point. But it's not up there and I think it needs to be up there. That's just, I'm just real frank. Second, it says we are in a waste crisis. That argument can get, can be picked apart, which concerns me because there are, there, it's, are there places for this stuff to go?

Yeah, there are other places for it to go. You can go Okeechobee, it can go to Georgia, it could go all kind of places. To me, we're in an environmental crisis and I know not everybody wants to use that word, but to me that's what the issue is. And because we're ground zero for climate change, that's a. I think what we don't want to do is be the cause of our own demise. And I think that's important. I think that sells. If everybody here knows we've all looked, we've got everybody, every city is part of the resilient roundtable. We know what is ahead of us. The 2050 plan, the 2070 plan, looking at where water is going to be, have to be contained, all those kind of things.

We need to connect those dots with this and that, because those are, that's where you see the overlap. I don't see us doing that on this. And I think when people connect those dots, it's powerful. And I think that's missing from this. If I'm speaking to a commission, those are the two points I want to hit home and I want to. Because those are two real points, cost and the climate change that we're facing in this county. So I, you know, I'm not sure where everybody else is, but I think if, I think those are selling points, I think they're. Because I think in general, the people of this county want to do the right thing environmentally. I think they want to.

They also, they may not be aware of the resilience plan, they may not be aware of the unified sea level curve, they may not be aware of that, but they have seen tides coming up, they're hearing this, they know that they feel every summer how much hotter it's getting. They're feeling that. And we don't have to convince them of climate change anymore. Now we have to let them know here's what we have to do about it. And if we connect what's happening here with this and say, you can't, we can't afford not to be part of this. And any city you can't afford, we can't afford for you to be sending all your stuff to a landfill, because what you're going to be doing right now is going to be aiding and abetting the cause the flooding in the future here.

If you're going to do that, here's what you're doing and we're going to tell you're doing that. And that's what we need to be saying to them. So I think it needs to be part of our, that to me is important to what we need to be saying. So let's, let me comment a little bit on this because I'M energized, obviously by the paramount social policy of the environmental impacts. But I'm also energized by the enormous mistakes made 50 years ago, the enormous mistake that was made for us to develop a system that required 31 cities to be at a table to make these decisions and allow cities to go in different directions competing against each other.

So when I use the term we have a waste crisis or a trash crisis, I don't believe that's undermining it because the decisions made 50 years ago, which we've inherited, have destined us to a lack of economic destiny and control that is tolerable. There is, we cannot ignore that there are going to be those who do not show share member for the paramount social policy. They just don't. And they would just as soon throw this on rail and send it to wherever and they don't care if it's in the U.S. or out of the U.S. but that's all well and good until you can't do that anymore or until that's your only choice and the market then has you over the barrel. That's what's happened to us. We don't own any of the infrastructure. We don't own any of the waste energy facility.



Speaker 1 - 02:13:26

We gave that away. We didn't. Somebody 50 years ago did. We don't own the landfill, we don't own the transfer stations, we don't own the infrastructure to process. We are at the beck and call of an industry. Some players are better than others. We're at the beck and call of market vagaries. We can't always hedge against those. But the moment that we fully commit, and to me, to those that do not accept the social paramount policy that you talk of, those who say I'd rather put it on rail are committing the same errors of 50 years ago. They are endorsing those errors and they are committing the next generation to economic disaster. Because once the monopolistic forces realize we have nowhere else to go and we have no capacity need to adjust or to pivot, they will crush us.



Speaker 1 - 02:14:20

And while an individual city for a certain election cycle can get away with a cheaper path of putting it on rail, that's all well and good until after that city management team is gone, after those elected officials are gone, they get held over the barrel and then they're going to have to justify the mistakes made. I say that not to push back against what you're saying, but that there's not a. These are not mutually exclusive concepts. And so if anything, I think what's really lacking. And it's up to us individually, you can't put this in a psa. It's up to us individually to find what we think is the most compelling point for why this needs to move forward or points and emphasize those as non competing and necessary.

So if I look at this because I worry about those that would just rather make short term financial decisions, I look at these presentations and say what it doesn't say is that we're giving up our economic future if we don't do this together. That if we don't do this, we are, there's going to be somebody down the road is going to say, you know what it was because so and so didn't agree to do this and now they're hiking up the cost. We have nowhere else to go. And we saw that happen with the recycling market when the Chinese decided they weren't going to deadhead all our stuff back. And we didn't have a capacity, we hadn't built it, we had no way to pivot. So I appreciate what you're saying.

What I would say is that to the extent that there are those that find that the most persuasive, I agree. To those that don't care about that as much as they should, perhaps economically you can't do it. And what we have seen from commercial players like City Furniture and the Panthers and others, they've said, look, yeah, that's important for the environment. That's a field we're showing you. Economically we could do this and we can make money at it and we can reduce our costs and it makes economic sense. And when that happens, to the cynics I say this would be bad economics not to move forward. No, I appreciate your points a lot because, and it's, and it actually should be one of those points. And you're what, wrapping all of what you're saying there is the ability to control your own destiny.

But that's not up there. And maybe it should be in addition to the what I just mentioned. Because I do think it might be hard to put in a bumper sticker. I think that's, you know what I mean? Because let me. And I'm just looking. These are, because these are, you know, we're trying to decide what are what our five talking points are going to be when we go to those city

questions, when it says Broward county is growing, that's nowhere near as compelling as what you just said. Nor is. Or I think what I would just talk about. That wouldn't be my second talking point.

But I think what we want to make sure is that when we go in front of those commissions, it is as compelling as possible.

And we have created a Broward county wide resiliency plan that is going to cost a fortune and it's going to save us twice that fortune. And this is exactly that. By protecting our environment, we are going to save the county in the long Run money and the future of our kids. So I think it's very easy to elevate the environment, but it should go hand in hand with affordability.

They are connected and we need to remind people they are connected. All right. I think we've given you direction and we know what's going on. Thank you to the education and subcommittee for that. I know it's mind blowing. There's. So let me update the governing board on the master plan facilities amendment schedule. As it noted, the MAS plan engagement toolkit.

We're hoping to have to all of the cities in the first week of December. The work again emphasizing get to your PIOs, your folks on staff, look at these toolkits, give the ideas. Thank you. To the subcommittee draft facilities amendment financial modeling is due January 5. The facilities amendment may come in before that. It's been discussed with executive committee this morning about the general elements of that. But the financial modeling, which has become such a central part, will be provided to all of the members by January 5th. At the last time we had done the ARC, pieced up and decided back to it. No, no, that's just. We just got to get moving forward. Everybody's on board on that. The complete final. You're welcome to do it.

I just, I. I want to make sure we get through this because we still have more business. The final master plan facilities amendment to the executive committee is expected January 9th. Again, I encourage all governing board members to attend the executive committee meetings as well. Executive committee will review the master plan and have that done on January 16th. Executive Committee will be either recommending up or down on both by February 20th. The governing board will adopt the master plan or reject it by March 20th. And then it goes on from there about recommending the facilities amendment and adoption in front of the commissions. The deadline for the cities to approve the facilities amendment, which is the governing document to be approved, is July 21. We are mindful a lot of commissions after June don't work as often, may not be as available.

So that's why these timelines have been moved up. That's why we've accelerated the issues of the financial modeling and everything else. Again, we'll emphasize it's critical that all the governing board members begin putting on their agendas. February, March updates as well as the prepare for the vote, prepare for when that has to happen in March and April. Give some room for additional questions or a necessary additional presentation so that we can meet. That should not really look at the July 21 deadline as anything other than the day that everything has to fall Apart, the deadline for ultimate adoption is August 14th. Any questions on the deadlines? As has been laid out and has been provided. Okay, we have to get through the selection of the members of the executive committee for 2026. Those terms have expired.

Mr. Cole, if you could explain the process for us. Certainly. Under the ila, there's three groups. We have large cities, medium cities and small cities. And the large city group has. There are nine members of the governing board, of which five are elected to the executive committee and one is an alternate. For the medium cities, there's also nine, and three are on the executive committee with one alternate. And for the small cities, there's ten of which two are elected to the executive committee with one alternate. So the terms are two year terms. So they're now up. So at this point, you need to decide either to keep people on or change people, whatever the desire of each group is the way the elections work or the selections actually are that it's chosen by the group of cities.

So the large group of cities, the nine choose five. So only those nine get to vote for those five. And then the same with the medium and the small. So, Mr. Chair, you should go large, then medium, then small. That for the large cities, out of the nine, you need to see who's willing to serve or who gets nominated to serve. And you ultimately need to select five and one alternate. So that's where you should start. Just to be clear, those members for large cities do not influence or select the other categories for medium or small, correct? That is correct. Second, the alternate is also someone who is selected or the city is selected in that process. Is that correct? Yes. Generally what we've done is the one who comes in sixth or for the medium city, fourth, and the small city third.

That person becomes the alternate. And the alternate is, as you've mentioned earlier, given the same rights other than voting. They sit at the table, they participate in the discussions, and when one of the other members is not there, they would take that person's voting. Right. For instance, today member Dunn was unable to attend. The alternate is Fort Lauderdale. They would have a full vote at the table because that member is not there. Correct? Yes. But even when the people are there, they can still be at the table and still participate. They just can't vote. Right. Just want to emphasize. So again, member Cagiano is not here. 


